CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

CURRICULAR PLANNING AND IMPLEMENTATION

Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words.

Description

The institution follows the curriculum prepared by the affiliated university. Following the academic calendar prepared by the university the college also prepares an academic calendar in the beginning of the academic year. At the department level also an action plan is prepared for each academic year by the Head of the Department. The elective papers are selected well in advance and time table, subject allotment, class teachers, mentors, project guides etc are done as per the decisions taken in the Staff meetings. Course plan is prepared by all the teachers and is recorded in their course diary. Different methods like lecture method, demonstrations, discussions, seminar presentations, use of audio-visuals etc are used in teaching. Study materials are uploaded in the Google Classroom and class hours are used mainly for discussions. Discussion videos of teachers and YouTube videos are also used for teaching. The students are also taken for field visits and study tours.

Three internal exams are planned to be conducted during every semester and the average of the best two exam results are taken for grading. Periodic evaluation is also done through assignments, seminar presentations, quizzes and weekly tests. The results of students are analysed by staff and discussed in the department meeting. Feedback is also collected from students, teachers, alumni and employers.

The students are grouped on 10 and a mentor is allotted to each group. The mentor keeps the records of the students and monitors their discipline and academic growth. The gifted learners and slow learners are identified by the teachers and different programs are chartered out for them. Support for slow learners is given in the form of remedial classes and group discussions, debates and seminar

presentations are conducted for the gifted students.

Bridge courses are also offered to the UG students during their entry to college to help them to cope with the shift from school to college. Coaching classes for competitive examinations, bank exam coaching classes etc are organised for the welfare of the students. Several career-oriented programmes are conducted for the students. The students join in these certificate courses and are benefited by them.

The college library contains the latest books, journals and periodicals. It also has facilities to access inflibnet, e- journals and ebooks. The college also hosts several national and international seminars and conferences every year for the welfare of the students and staff. NSS,NCC,YRC etc focus on extension activities and focus on collaboration with the society.

A grievance redressal committee functions in the college to address the grievances of the students. A complaint box is also fixed near the principal's office for the students to drop their complaints. The mechanism for internal assessment is robust and maintains objectivity and transparency while conducting internal examinations and consolidating the internal marks. The answer scripts are distributed to the students, the marks are entered in the course file of the teacher and displayed in the department notice board and then uploaded in the online portal of the college and later to the university.

How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Analysis

The college assesses the feedback given by the stakeholders namely students, teachers, employers, parents and alumni. The IQAC analyses the structured feedback collected from the stakeholders and presents it to appropriate bodies like staff counsel for further actions to be taken. The staff members representing the college in the Board of Studies represent these observations for bringing changes in the curriculum. The feedback is collected from the students and teachers annually and from the parents during annual Parents meetings in the departments or general meetings.

The alumni feedback is collected during the graduation day conducted by the college and department alumni meetings or general alumni meet. The questionnaire is given with statements against a 4-point scale. The feedback shows that they are happy with the teaching methods used and the measures undertaken for general discipline in the campus. The alumni feedback stresses the need for inviting more companies for placement drives on campus. The number of University ranks is a very good feedback for the teaching learning process in the Institution. The students felt that the curriculum was useful for getting employment serving their needs.

The students of a class are divided into groups of 10 and one teacher is allotted to each group from the department. The basic details of the students are collected by each mentor. The mentor maintains a register to keep the record of the students. The mentor listens to the student who shares matters regarding academic and personal. The mentor motivates the students and helps them in the learning process. The students facing difficulties in academic and personal life are given guidance and counselling. The mentor addresses the mentee in a friendly manner and gives them confidence to face the challenges of life. Students interested in sports and games and fine arts are identified and are encouraged to take part in various competitions organised by the college and other institutions. After getting the periodic feedback from the mentors separate counselling sessions are arranged for the group addressing those issues identified.

Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The continuous internal evaluation system (CIE) at the institutional level follows the guidelines prescribed by the affiliating university. Based on the syllabus given in the curriculum, portions are completed by the teachers as per the lesson plan and course diary. Three internal examinations are conducted for each course and the average of the best two performances are taken for grading. This is calculated for 20 marks for UG and 15 marks for PG. 5 marks is allotted for assignment in UG and 10 marks for assignment and seminar presentation in PG. The external examination is conducted for 75 marks. In addition to the internal examinations, weekly tests and quizzes are conducted. At the end of the semester model examination is conducted and the performance of the students is evaluated before the University exam. The students are asked to work out the previous year's question papers which are available in the college website.

The marks obtained by the students of a class are displayed in the department notice board and individual marks are sent to the parents through computerized sheet. The performance of the wards is also discussed with the parents during the class wise parents meetings conducted by the Department. As per the university regulations, the excellence of students in co-curricular and extracurricular activities are also recorded and the students are motivated with special awards and prizes.

Remedial coaching is conducted to the students who are weak performers in the Unit test. We conduct Quizzes and problem solving sessions for the students and advanced learners are encouraged to attend quiz competitions and seminars conducted by other colleges. Also they are encouraged to appear for Competitive examinations.

Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The academic calendar prepared by the IQAC of our college is based on the academic calendar framed by the University for the year. This is done prior to the commencement of the academic year. The calendar gives the date of commencement of classes for UG, PG and MPhil programmes. It also encloses the tentative dates for Internal assessment examinations as well as university semester exams with its possible semester break. Academic calendar is designed with dates along with the college day order for each date which is very helpful for the students to refer to. It also accurately indicates the national as well as international occasions to be celebrated during the academic year. Public holidays are furnished with the name of the occasion. The college celebrations like Fine Arts day, Onam Celebrations, Annual day, sports day, alumni day and various other programs are mentioned in the calendar. The patriotic proceedings such as the national pledge, national anthem are also part of the college handbook. The handbook also contains the details of the teaching and non teaching staff members, departments and Committees, programmes and courses offered by the institution with the course codes and so on.
