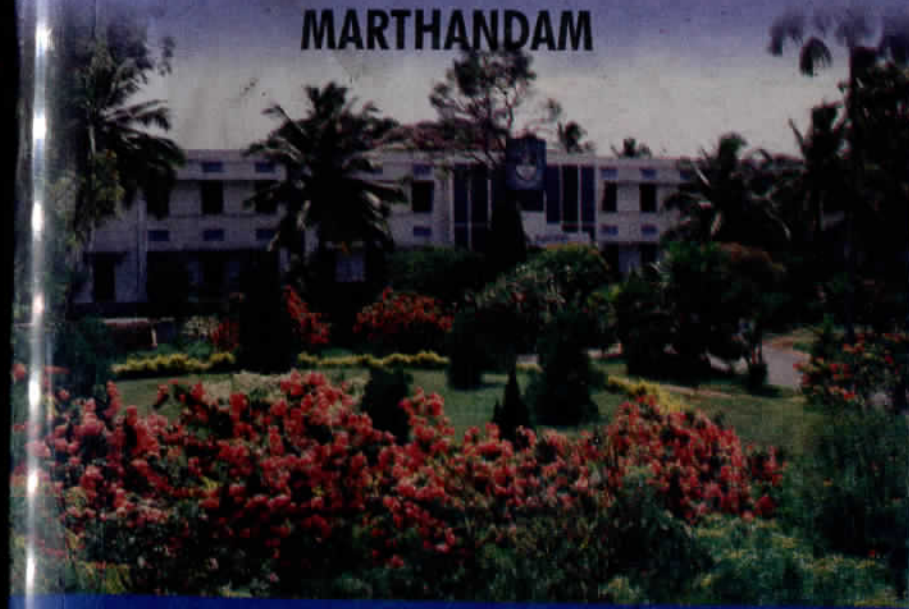

OUR PATRON MARSHAL A. NESAMONY

- * Born on 12-06-1895 at Nesarapuram, Vilavancode Taluk, Kanyakumari District.
- * Graduated at Trivandrum Maharaja College and studied law at Law College, Trivandrum. Started his legal profession in 1921.

His role in Public life :

- * 1943 - 1947 : Chairman of Nagercoil Municipality.
- * 1945 - 1947 : Member of Travancore Legislative Assembly.
- * 1948 - 1952 : Member of Travancore - Cochin Legislative Assembly.
- * 1952 - 1957 : Member of Parliament, Nagercoil Constituency (First term)
- * 1955 : Elected as President, of Travancore Tamil Nadu Congress party
- * 1956 : The Yeoman service rendered by him, ultimately, paved the way for the merger of the South Travancore (Kanyakumari District) with Tamilnadu.
- * 1957 - 1962 } : Member of Tamilnadu Legislative Assembly.
- * 1962 - 1967 } : Member of Parliament, Nagercoil (Second term)
- 1967 - 1968 : " (Third term)

His role in the Diocese :

- * 1933 - 1947 : Secretary, Travancore & Mission Church Councils.
- * 1934 - 1942 : South District Pastorate Council.
- * 1947 - 1960 : Vice President, South Travancore Diocesan Council, C.S.I.
- * 1960 - 1968 : Vice - President, Kanyakumari Diocesan Council, C.S.I.
- * He Passed away on June 1, 1968.
- * Even today, he is venerated as Samaritan of the people of Kanyakumari.

1. A BRIEF HISTORY

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE COLLEGE

Foundation :

In the year 1868 **Rev. James Emly** from New Castle, U.K., an L.M.S. missionary bought lands where the college is located now. **Rev. Robert Sinclair** who succeeded Rev. Emly in the year 1910 built a bungalow and started Boarding School on the campus measuring 2 acres.

After independence the long felt need for college at Marthandam resulted in the starting of the Christian College in June 1964 by the Kanyakumari Diocese of the Church of South India. The Executive Committee of the Diocese which met on 04-01-1964, entrusted the responsibility of raising funds for the buildings needed to an adhoc committee consisting of Messrs. **N. Dennis (Convener), G.A. Ambrose J. Nesamony, P.S. Wilson** and **Rev. M. Amos**. The Diocese set apart sufficient extent of wet lands as endowment to satisfy the University requirement. The public in and around Marthandam, the parents, students and members of the teaching and non-teaching staff took keen interest in the growth of the College and contributed substantial amounts at different times for its development.

With the permission of the Madras University the Pre-University course was started in 1964 with just 171 students. The college was inaugurated on 6th Aug. 1964 by the then Bishop **Rt. Rev. I.R.H. Gnanadason**. In June 1965, the College was upgraded to degree level with Mathematics, History and Economics as major subjects. From the academic year 1966 '97, the College was affiliated to the Madurai University. The College became a Post Graduate institution in the year 1980-81. A Ph.D Research centre in History was added in the year 1997 in the regular scheme. The college offers 11 U.G., 6 P.G., and M.Phil., & Ph.D. courses. The present student strength is 2060. At present 87 teaching and 41 non-teaching staff are working in the college as regular members of staff.

In the year 1991 the College was affiliated to the newly started Manonmaniam Sundaranar University, Tirunelveli. In the marvellous growth of the college, God has guided and blessed us immensely. With faith in divine guidance and co-operation from the public, it is hoped that the College will grow further into a fruitful temple of learning.

The Nomenclature of the College :

In June 1984 the College was re-named as Nesamony Memorial Christian College in recognition of the yeoman service rendered by late Thiru. A. Nesamony B.A., B.L. to the Kanyakumari Diocese of the Church of South India.

The Emblem :

The emblem of our College bears a Cross, a Church, a Palmyrah tree, a Star, a Book and a Lotus flower. The cross shows that our college is a Christian Institution. The Church signifies sanctification, as we get sanctified through prayer. The Palmyrah tree, is a special feature of the district. Every part of it is useful in our daily life. At the top is a Star which stands for guidance. We look up to Him whenever we are in distress. The open Book and the Lotus, our National flower, symbolise knowledge and wisdom respectively, which we impart to our dear students on the campus. Our motto - **FAITH, ENDEAVOUR AND POWER** - embraces all these features.

Objective :

The main objective of this college is to provide higher education to socially and economically backward people in and around Marthandam. For the last 38 years, this institution has been striving hard to achieve this goal. A number of innovative programmes and projects are being carried out in this college to bring light to the downtrodden people of this area. We hope that in the near future N.M.C. College Marthandam will accomplish its basic goal.

2. ADMINISTRATION

THE COLLEGE ADMINISTRATION

The Nesamony Memorial Christian College is owned and managed by the Kanyakumari Diocese of the Church of South India. The Executive committee of the Diocese appoints the Principal of the College. The College Governing Board, constituted by the Diocese, makes all other appointments subject to the approval of the Executive Committee. The major financial and administrative policies of the College are formulated by the Governing Board. The general administration of the College vests in the Principal. He is assisted by the Vice-Principal in the day-to-day administration of the College. In the absence of the Principal, the Vice-Principal or the authorized Professor in station shall be in charge of the routine affairs of the College. The Principal shall be responsible for supervising the maintenance of the accounts and properties of the College in accordance with the rules stipulated by the University, the Government and the Management.

The Heads of Departments will be responsible to the Principal for the organization, co-ordination and smooth running of their departments.

THE STAFF COUNCIL

**4. FEES, CONCESSIONS, SCHOLARSHIPS
 &
 ENDOWMENT PRIZES**

(A) TUITION FEES :

Every student has to pay the whole fees prescribed for each semester during any part of which his name is on the rolls and his attendance registered whether such fees he paid in one or two instalments.

The first instalment of fees for the academic year will be collected before reopening or at the time of admission and the special fees will not be refunded if the student fails to join the College or leaves after joining. The second instalment will be collected in November.

The schedule for repayment of fees will be notified.

According to the Tamil Nadu Education Rule 90(a) "if a student fails to pay his fee on the day fixed for payment, a fine at the rate of 25 paise per day has to be collected from the date of implementing the fine. If a student fails to remit his/her fees with fine by the end of the month his/her name has to be removed from the rolls. Absence from College with or without leave application is no ground for exemption from the operation of this rule. If re admitted, he must pay in addition to the fees and fine due from him, a re-admission fee of Rs.2. Holders of fee concession and of scholarships of any kind are also bound by all the above regulations.

(B) CONCESSIONS AND SCHOLARSHIPS :

The management and the Government, both the state and the central, have come forward to help students in their study in various forms. Eligibility conditions are announced as and when needed through notices to the students. Forms will be issued to students at the college finance office in time. These scholarships and concessions should be applied for only after the students pay the first semester fees in full and enroll in the college. Scholarship and fee concession holders must secure 75% of the attendance, failing which they run the risk of losing these scholarships and concessions.

Eligibility :

1. All Scheduled caste / Scheduled tribe students.
2. Children of serving military personnel whose parents are not getting educational allowance.
3. Dependents of serving military personnel who are not getting children's educational allowance.
4. Children of Repatriates from Burma and Ceylon.
5. Adhoc merit Grant to Scheduled caste / Tribe students including converts to Christianity from S.C. who have secured 60% and above marks in the final Higher Secondary (XII Std) Examination.

(i). SCHOLARSHIPS

1. Adhi Dhraivida Scholarship for the Hind Scheduled Caste / Tribe students. Income limit is Rs. 50920/- per annum.
2. Govt. of India Scholarship for the Physical Handicapped and the Blind. Income limit Rs. 20920/- per annum.
3. National.
4. Scholarship for children of Primary and Secondary School Teachers is given to 7 students of Tamil Nadu selected on merit cum means basis. Students who have Secure 60% marks in the qualifying examination and whose parent's annual income does not exceed Rs. 24000/- are eligible to apply. For those whose parent's income not exceed Rs.24000/- per annum, a merit certificate and a national prize of Rs. 100/- is given.
5. **Scholarship of first generation graduates**
This Scholarship is given to students who come from families where there are no graduates and whose parental income does not exceed Rs. 25000/- per annum. This is given to students who are studying U.G. courses and continue their studies till the completion of the course. If they break their studies they should refund the whole amount they received to the Government.

6. **Nagammayar fee concession** : This fee concession is awarded to all girl students belonging to backward classes and girls of Nair community whose parent's income does not exceed 24000/-. They should continue their studies till the completion of the course lest they should refund the concession amount to the Govt. Income certificate obtained from the Tahasildar should be submitted every year to the college.
7. Scholarship to children of freedom fighters and political sufferers who have undergone more than six months imprisonment.
8. Dependants of Ex-Servicemen can apply through the D.S.S.A. Board.
9. The incentive for Tamil Medium Students will be Rs. 400/- for degree students as per the Government rules.

(ii). State Govt. Scholarships :

1. Department of Harijan Welfare awards/ scholarships to Scheduled Caste / Scheduled Tribe students including converts whose parent's annual income does not exceed Rs. 50000/- These students should not avail of Govt. of India post Merit Scholarship.
2. State Govt. Scholarships for physically handicapped and the blind.

3. Department of Backward Class awards scholarships to all B.C. and M.B.C. students including Hindu Nadars, Christian Nadars and Ezhavas. Income Limit is Rs. 25000/- per annum. Students of M.B.C. have no income limit.

Eligible students should get the proper forms from the Finance office. Filled in application forms accompanied by attested copies of mark sheet and first page of the S.S.L.C. should be submitted before the 25th of July. The Certificate of income and Community Certificate should be signed by the Tahsildar only.

The Community Certificate should agree with the community mentioned in the S.S.L.C. book. Incomplete application forms will not be accepted.

(iii). Other Scholarships

1. Church Worker's Children Scholarship
2. Non-teaching Staff's Children Scholarship

These two Scholarships are given to the children of Church Workers and Non-teaching staff studying in this college. The amount of Scholarship is determined on the basis of the available funds and number of the beneficiaries.

(C). STUDENT AID FUND

The student aid fund is built up by the student aid fee of Rs. 2/- collected from each student. This will be available in the form of cash for poor deserving students to meet examination fee, a small part of tuition fee, cost of specific books essential for their study, clothing or medical expenses.

Meritorious but poor students who wish to avail of this fund, can apply to the Principal through their HOD. Based on the recommendations of the HOD and the advice of the advisory body consisting of student and staff representatives the Principal will administer the fund. In addition to the financial status and academic performance, the conduct and character of the beneficiary will also be an important determining factor in the selection of students to be paid from the above fund.

The interest of the endowment (Rs. 1,000/-) out of the endowment amount of Rs. 4,000/- instituted by Prof. A.J. Harris is available for the purpose of extending aid to the deserving students.

(D) FREE MID DAY MEAL SCHEME

With the financial assistance contributed monthly by the staff and donations from the students and well wishers, the College provides free mid-day meal on working days to a limited number of really needy students. There is a large number in this category. But paucity of funds limits the number of students served. Any amount of help will be welcome from any source to meet this peculiar need of the unfortunate of this area.

The interest of the endowment namely Rev. Harris Memorial endowment (Rs. 1,000/-) Miss. Isaacs Endowment (Rs. 1,000/-) and the endowment (Rs. 7,000/-) Instituted by the college union of 1978-'79 are also available for the purpose of giving mid-day meals to poor students.

(E) ENDOWMENT PRIZES

The following endowment prizes have been instituted by philonthrophists either by themselves or by their families or by their well wishers by depositing the amount mentioned against their names in this college. The annual income from these amounts will be presented as endowment prizes on their names to the meritorious students every year according to the wishes of the donors.

5. RULES & REGULATIONS

RULES REGARDING :

(a) General Discipline

1. All students should be neatly dressed befitting an atmosphere of work and study. Students are advised not to wear caps inside the campus.
2. The behaviour of students inside and outside the college premises should be gentlemanly. Indecent behaviour towards teachers or fellow students or others will entail serious punishment.
3. The students should move silently when proceeding from one classroom to another and other times, so as not to disturb classes or others at work.
4. Every student should greet teachers respectfully on the occasion of his first meeting them for the day.
5. Students should be in their classes in time and shall sit according to their numbers.
6. On the teacher entering the classroom all students shall rise from their seats and remain standing till the teacher directs them to sit or he takes his seat.
7. No student shall leave the classroom or laboratory without the permission of the teacher-in-charge.

8. No late comer shall enter the classroom without the permission of the teacher-in-charge.
9. The cleanliness and safety of the College building and its property is the responsibility of every student. They shall not disfigure any part of the building or any piece of furniture by writing or etching on it, or throwing trash and paper all around. Waste materials should be thrown into the dustbins only. Breach of this rule will be treated as a serious offence.
10. Students are prohibited from organizing or attending meetings in the College, distributing notices or hand bills or collecting money for any purpose without the permission of the Principal.
11. Students shall not address any authority in a collective petition or make complaints in a body. Such combined action is subversive of good order. All requests, petitions, complaints and appeals should be made to the Principal or concerned officers of the college directly or through their group tutors.
12. Every student must have the identity card with his / her latest photograph affixed and attested by the Principal. Identity cards should be shown as required by the authorities in Transport Buses when travelling on concession tickets.

13. Smoking, use of alcohol or intoxicating drinks and consumption of drugs by students is strictly prohibited.

14. The college authorities will not be responsible for misconduct or criminal offence outside the college. Students are expected to behave in a fitting manner even outside the college so as to keep up the good name of the Alma mater.

15. The men students should not enter the premises of the girl's retaining rooms including the verandas under any circumstances, so that the privacy of the girl's retaining rooms is maintained.

16. Any student

- (i) Who is persistently insubordinate
- (ii) Who is habitually irregular in attendance or inattentive to his work in class,
- (iii) Who is repeatedly or willfully mischievous or obscene in word or act,
- (iv) Who is guilty of fraud or malpractice in examinations,
- (v) Who takes part in political agitations in any movement causing social discord, will be removed from the rolls temporarily or permanently according to the offence.

(b) ATTENDANCE & LEAVE

1. University and College rules require regular attendance in all classes - theory and practical, Games, N.C.C., N.S.S., and other part V subjects.

2. Leave should be applied for, in advance in the form available at the Finance office. Leave application shall be addressed to the Vice-Principal.

3. Absence without leave is punishable with fine.

4. Attendance is taken at the beginning of each class. Absence in one class either in the morning or evening will amount to absence for half a day.

5. In case of unforeseen and unavoidable circumstances, the leave application shall be submitted immediately on return after absence.

6. A student absenting himself from the College for more than 15 consecutive working days without satisfactory explanation is liable to be removed from the rolls.

7. Application for leave, in the case of illness should be counter signed by the parent or guardian. Application for sick leave for more than three days should be accompanied by medical certificate.

8. No student will be exempted from Tests or Assignments.
9. Fee concession holders and scholarship holders should have minimum 90% attendance (G.O. 666 of 24.4 1979)
10. Students have to put in 75% attendance for writing university examination without paying condonation fee to the University, Rs. 300/- will be charged from those who have 60% to 75% attendance, and if less than 60% the semester has to be repeated.

(C) STUDENTS' UNION

CONSTITUTION :

ARTICLE - I : AIM

- A. The aim of the Union is to help students engage themselves in meaningful pursuits outside the co-curricular programme of the College and to provide opportunities for training as good citizens.
- B. The union will try to achieve these aims mainly through debates, lectures, meetings and cultural programmes.

Article II : Membership

All students of the college shall be deemed to be members of the Union, for the academic year and all members of the staff shall be its honorary members.

Article III : Office Bearers of the Executive committee

- A. The Principal is the President of the Union, and he may appoint three members of the staff to the executive committee of the Union, out of which one will be the Treasurer and two will be Advisors.
- B. There shall be an elected Chairman and a Secretary for the Union.
- C. The Chairman may preside over ordinary meetings of the Union. The Principal or the Vice- Principal shall preside over business and special meetings of the Union and also the meetings of the Executive Committee.
- D. The Secretary shall arrange the meetings of the Union in consultation with the President and Chairman and shall conduct other matters of the Union according to the decision of the President and the Executive Committee of the Union.
- E. The Executive Committee will consist of the following :
 1. The Principal
 2. The Vice - Principal
 3. Three staff members nominated by the Principal
(2 advisors and 1 Treasurer)
 4. The Chairman (students' union)

5. The Secretary (students' union)
6. Seven other elected members (students' union)
7. Two other students to be co-opted by the committee on nomination by the Principal to secure fair representation.

Article IV : Election :

- A. All the students of the college shall have the right to vote to contest in the election of the College Union. The Chairman and the Secretary shall be from the third year degree classes or second year P.G. classes and they should not have any arrear papers up to 2nd Semester, in the University examination. Those contesting for Union Executive Committee should have no arrear papers in the 1st and 2nd semesters.
- B. Students elected as Chairman, Secretary and Executive Committee members of the Union shall not hold office in any other association in the College and shall resign other offices to which they may have been elected earlier.
- C. The election of the Chairman, Secretary and student members of the Executive Committee will be conducted by President or by the Advisor appointed by him. Elections shall generally be by secret ballot.
- D. Elections shall not be on any political basis.
- E. If any student is identified as guilty and fined Rs. 50/- and above, that student shall not be eligible to contest in any of the student Union elections.

Article V : Meetings of the Executive Committee

- A. The Executive Committee of the Union shall discuss the programme of activities at least once a semester.
- B. A notice of at least three days shall be given for meetings of the Committee by the Secretary. Urgent or special meetings may be convened on short notice on the authorization of the President.
- C. Written minutes shall be recorded of all the proceedings of business meetings and of other meetings of the Committee.
- D. 50 percent shall be the quorum for the Executive meeting.
- E. If any student is identified as guilty and fined Rs. 50/- and above, that student shall not be eligible to contest in any of the student Union elections.
- F. The President has the right to convene the Executive Committee of the Union at any time.

The President shall have the power to issue directions for the proper conduct of meetings and other affairs of the union and to revise the regulations. His interpretation of the regulation and his decisions in any dispute shall be final.

CODE OF CONDUCT FOR THE ELECTED STUDENT - OFFICE BEARERS IN COLLEGES

(Vide proceedings of the Director of Collegiate Education No. 5763116/82 date 29.9.82)

1. The office bearers of the College Union shall co-operate fully with the Principal and staff of the college in promoting intellectual and cultural activities amongst students.
2. The college Union Office - bearers shall take upon themselves the responsibility of not involving in any act of indiscipline leading to disruption of normal life on the campus.
3. The problems and issues in the college shall be resolved by representation and negotiations and not by resorting to any other method.
4. The office-bearers shall under no circumstance deem it as part of their duty to represent to the authorities on matters and causes, which do not fall under the purview of the college Union.
5. The Office - bearers may make their representations to the Principal only on matters pertaining to the general interest of the students and not on individual cases.
7. The Union Office - bearers shall not interfere directly or indirectly in matters involving discipline and action thereon, which are the responsibilities of the Principal.

8. No decision on the activities/programmes of the College Union shall be taken by the Union Office bearers except with the recommendations of the Student's Council (by any name the Council is known in the college) consisting of the office - bearers of the Department Associations and staff advisers and approval of the Principal.
9. The Budget for the College Union shall be prepared by the College Union Office - bearers in consultation with the Student Council and the staff advisers. This shall be submitted to the Principal for approval.
10. It shall be obligatory on the part of the college Union Office - bearers to present the statement of accounts of the College Union twice a semester to the Student's Council.
11. The Office - bearers shall not invite any outsider to the college for meetings and functions except with the approval and consent of the Principal.
12. The Union Office - bearers shall not issue any press statements pertaining to the college matters without the prior permission of the Principal.
13. The Union Office - bearers shall not involve themselves in any kind of fund - raising campaigns except with the specific approval of the Principal.

14. The above said instructions shall be followed and those who violate these shall be dealt with suitably.

(d) ASSOCIATIONS

Every discipline has its own association :

The Principal is the Patron of all associations. The Head of the Department of the concerned subject is the President. The next Senior Professor in the department is the Vice President of the association. The Secretary is elected from the final year degree class representatives.

The President and the Vice-President are elected from among the teacher members of the association. The Secretaries are elected from among the students, by the representatives of the various classes.

The aim of all the associations is to help students engage themselves in meaningful pursuits to develop qualities of leadership and good citizenship. The office-bearers of the various associations shall organize debates, guest lectures pertaining to the respective subjects and also do everything possible to develop their higher instincts. All such programmes should be undertaken with the concurrence of the Presidents of the respective associations and the Principal.

The student office-bearers of the associations shall not involve themselves in any act of indiscipline leading to disruption of normal life on the campus. They shall not interfere directly or indirectly in matters involving discipline and action there on, which are the responsibilities of the Principal.

The Secretary of each association shall in consultation with the other office-bearers and the President of the association prepare the programme of activities for the year and the budget for the same soon after the association elections are over. Under no circumstance expenditure in connection with the activities of each association shall exceed the amount allotted to each association by the Principal.

The 11th company of the College NCC has a strength of 160 Cadets (with Head Quarters at Nagercoil). The aims of the N.C.C. are :

- (a) To develop qualities of character, courage, comradeship, discipline, leadership, secular outlook, spirit of adventure and sportsmanship and the ideals of selfless service among the youth to make them useful citizens.
- (b) To create a human resource of organized, trained and motivated youth, to provide leadership in all walks of life including the armed forces and to make them always available for the service of the nation.

The tenure of N.C.C. training is normally two years. In cases of exceptional cadets, it may be extended to the third year. The N.C.C. training consists of drill with or without arms; weapon training, map reading, bayonet -fighting, range firing with rifle and light machine gun, elementary military field tactics, study of army organization and allied subjects. Selected cadets

will have the privilege of attending Annual Training Camp, Summer Training Camp, Advanced Leadership Training Camp, Republic Day Parade, Mountaineering Courses and Attachment to Army Units.

There will be 40 parades per year. Attendance is compulsory for all parades. Punctuality, good turn out and active, disciplined participation is expected of all cadets.

The cadets will have the chance of appearing for B and C Certificate examinations according to the proficiency attained.

(b) National Service Scheme - N.S.S.

There are three N.S.S. units-Unit Nos 82, 83 and 139 under the Youth Welfare Department of the Manonmaniam Sundaranar University. The authorized strength is 100 in each unit. The aims of the N.S.S. are :

- 1. To work with and among people.
- 2. To engage in creative and constructive social action.
- 3. To enhance his/her knowledge of himself/herself and the community through a confrontation with reality.
- 4. To put his/her scholarship to practical use in mitigating atleast some of the social problems.

5. To gain skills in programme development to enable him/her to get employment.
6. To gain skills in the exercise of democratic leadership.
7. To provide facilities to the students to have physical, social, emotional and intellectual development.

Enrolment :

Students of degree classes with good physique and a positive attitude and who have the liking to work with and for the underprivileged alone will be enrolled. They must be fully aware of the objectives and the responsibilities involved. Enrolment will be completed before 1st August.

There shall be a college level N.S.S. committee under the chairmanship of the Principal with a Programme Officer as Convenor. The committee may consist of not more than 10 and shall include some senior members of staff, students and leading citizens interested in the scheme. This Advisory Committee may chalk out the programme for the year. A minute book for recording the proceedings of the advisory committee should be maintained.

The N.S.S. programme officers will give further details regarding the projects and programmes.

(c) Physical Education :

There are facilities for the following games: Foot Ball, Volley Ball, Tennis, Shuttle Cock, Ball Badminton, Cricket, Tennikoit and Throw Ball. Training is given for all athletic events. There are facilities for indoor games like Table-Tennis, Chess and Carroms. Intra-mural tournaments are conducted by the College. Inter-collegiate tournaments are organized by the University. The college teams also participate in the events conducted by other organizations locally and at the district level.

Students of all classes with aptitude and interest are always welcome to use the facilities for sports and games in the college.

Further particulars and details will be available from the concerned department from time to time.

(d) Audio Visual Education :

Feature films of educational and cultural value are screened periodically. It is planned to build up a film library of educational films, film strips and slides. The College has two 17 m.m. Projectors, Epidiascope film strip Projector, and overhead projectors.

II. CO-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES :

COURSE OPTIONAL

(a) Youth Welfare Club :

The youth Welfare Club has been functioning very effectively in the college for the past two decades. The aim of the club is to tap the talents that, very often, remain dormant in a student and to help him develop them. Some of the students have a flair for fine arts and they are encouraged to participate in various competitions so that they can mould their personality. The club congratulates those students who have brought many a laurel to the institution competing in various programmes conducted by the University and other organizations.

(b) Eco Club :

The Eco Club, since its inception in 1992, has been engaged in the task of creating an environmental awareness among the students, the faculty and the community at large. Some of the multifaceted and unique activities of the Club are distribution of saplings, organising trekking expeditions and holding seminars, developing an arboretum and a rockery in the campus and maintaining an aquarium for the benefit of the 'special children'.

(c) Consumer Guidance Forum :

In order to create consumer awareness among teaching staff, non-teaching staff and also among the students, a Consumer Guidance Forum started functioning in our College from the academic year 1996-1997. The objectives of the forum are :

- (i) to create consumer awareness among teaching staff, non-teaching staff and students of this college.
- (ii) To guide those people who seek help for the redressal of consumer disputes.
- (iii) To update knowledge in the field of consumer education.

(d) Youth Red Cross :

"The youth Red Cross" is organised for the purpose of inculcating in the Youth of this country an awareness especially in relation to the care of their own health and helpfulness to others. It is based on the three fold programme of protection of health and life, service to the sick and suffering and promotion of National and International friendship, to develop the mental and moral capacities of the youth.

(e) Extension Service :

Village adoption

As a part of the extension activities of our college, we have adopted two most backward villages. One is Pathukani village in Vilavancode Taluk. It is a tribal belt area without any basic facilities. The other one is Kalingarajapuram which is a coastal area of Vilavancode Taluk. It is socially and economically very backward. The objective in adopting these villages is :

- to conduct community development programmes;

- to encourage adult education and literacy programmes;

- to develop environmental awareness programmes;

- to conduct social work camps with the help of the N.G.Os;

- to make the people aware of Govt. welfare schemes;

- to have health hygiene awareness camps;

- to give education to the local people on numerous rights;

- to create awareness among the people about the consumer problems.

7. CAMPUS FACILITIES AND STUDENTS' AMENITIES

U.G. students who belong to the social and educationally backward classes are provided with book bank facilities. They can borrow books from the library for a whole semester which they need not return before the semester examination. Every student in the college is eligible for membership in the library. On production of the identity card at the library counter, borrowers' tickets will be issued to the students for the

(A) LIBRARY AND BOOK BANK :

The library is named after Rev. James Emlyn an LMS Missionary from U.K. who purchased lands where Nesamony Memorial Christian College is built. The college library is a fairly large one with a collection of about 47000 volumes in all disciplines. The library regularly subscribes to 10 dailies, and more than 30 standard journals in almost all subjects besides general periodicals in Tamil, English and Malayalam. The general reading room can accommodate nearly 100 readers at a time. Separate reference section is maintained for the benefit of the Post Graduate students and researchers. Library automation is going on. Open access is given to all students. The Library is kept open on all working days from 9.15 a.m. to 4.15 p.m. During vacation the library will be kept open on all Wednesdays.

U.G. students who belong to the socially and educationally backward classes are provided with book bank facilities. They can borrow books from the library for a whole semester which they needn't return before the semester examination.

Every student in the college is eligible for membership in the library. On production of the identity card at the Library counter, Borrower's Tickets will be issued to the students for the

purpose of borrowing books from the Library. The books borrowed from the library should be returned within fifteen calendar days, failing which an overdue charge of 25 paise per day will be collected. If the book is not on demand, it will be renewed for another fifteen days. For renewal, the book should be presented at the counter. Each one is personally responsible for the book borrowed on one's ticket. If a borrower's ticket is lost, a duplicate will be issued on payment of Rs. 10/-. Books are to be handled very carefully. If any book is damaged when in possession it should either be replaced or its cost be paid with an additional 50% of the cost along with overdue charges.

Reference books and periodicals are available only for reference in the Library. Strict silence should be maintained in the library and reading room. No students will be allowed to belittle the academic atmosphere which is the life time of the library.

(B) Students' Book Store :

The Student's Book Store functions in the College to get all books and note books available, to the students in time. The books are ordered centrally and distributed to the students in the

beginning of each semester. The cost of the books is collected in instalments. The balance of money collected and the cost of books not issued to students will be refunded at the end of the year. Students are asked to check up the individual account cards maintained in the Book Store before closing the accounts for the year. Accounts of students who leave the College during the year will be settled immediately before getting the Transfer Certificate. Students are instructed to note down the cost of books they receive for future reference.

(C) COMPUTER CENTRE

The N.M.Christian College Computer Centre caters to the needs of the department of Computer Science. The centre offers programmes for the staff and students during the summer vacation. The centre has also signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with Continuing Education Extension Cell (CEEC), Government Polytechnic, Nagercoil. Through CEEC, it offers courses, such as, Office Automation, M.S. Office 2000, D.T.P., C++, Visual Basic, Computer Hardware and Internet, especially, to socially and economically backward students.

(D) PERSONALITY DEVELOPEMENT :

- Grievance Redressal

- Counselling

- Moral Instruction

This committee assists the students in overcoming academic, social, personal or emotional problems. It aims at helping students adjust themselves to the demands of college life and acquaint themselves with the various resources available in the college and through the college. It helps students develop life goals that will be challenging to their innate talents, capabilities and aptitudes.

(E) HUMAN RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT (HRD) REMEDIAL COACHING :

A remedial coaching committee has started functioning in the college from this academic year. One of the major objectives of this committee is to conduct U.G.C./C.S.I.R. Coaching of class for those appearing for research fellowship examinations after completion their post graduate studies. The Committee is entrusted with providing model

questions to each department and to provide sufficient reference materials for paper II. The committee is also planning to conduct coaching classes for civil service examinations. Since many of our students are weak in part II English, the committee will make arrangement to conduct remedial coaching in Part II English for the final year UG students.

(F) CAREER GUIDANCE CELL :

One of the important Committees, constituted recently in our campus, is Career Guidance Cell. Dedicated staff members of our college are with this committee. Its major objectives are :

To provide available information on the jobs/positions, opportunities, etc.

To provide necessary literature/brochure/information/entrepreneurship

To conduct Seminar/Workshop

To measure the aptitude towards preference of jobs.

To organise campaign in the campus.

To generate resources for the needy students to apply for jobs / starting enterprises.

(G) ROAD SAFETY PATROL (RSP) :

Under the National Service Scheme of N.M.C. College Marthandam (No.82, 83 and 139), a Road Safety Patrol started functioning in the college from this year with the guidance of Mr. Judson, Co-ordinator, Road Patrol for Kanyakumari and Nellore Districts. About 42 student volunteers of N.S.S. are members of this patrol. They are helping in maintaining traffic regulations in and around Marthandam. The inauguration of this programme was conducted on 09-03-2002 at Marthandam Junction.

(H) ANTI EVE TEASING CELL :

As per the instruction of the Govt. of Tamil Nadu, an Anti- Eve Teasing Cell has started functioning in our College from the academic year 2001-2002.

The major activities of this cell include the conduct of periodic seminars on anti eve-teasing and competitions on the theme 'anti eve-teasing'. The cell also gives counselling to students on the problems related to anti-eve teasing.

(I) ALUMNI ASSOCIATION :

All the students who have studied in Nesamony Memorial Christian College are encouraged to become members of the association and to involve actively in the programmes conducted by the association.

Every student who leaves the college is register his name with the association by paying Rs. 100/- for three years and later he/she can become a life member by paying Rs. 500/- The annual membership fee is Rs. 50/-. Periodic meetings of the Alumini are held in the campus for various groups divided according to their profession. Occasional gathering of the Alumini is arranged and the help of the Alumini is sought in guiding the present student in planning their future career.

(J) PARENTS' TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION (PTA) :

Parents' Teachers' Association was started on 21.04.1994. The general body meeting of the association is convened once in a year. The Executive Committee meets at least six times a year. The association plays a vital role in providing infrastructure for the college. It also involves in the overall development of the students

(K) STUDENTS' CHRISTIAN MOVEMENT :

The Students' Christian Movement (SCM) provides christian values to the protestant christian students of the College. The Principal is the Patron of the movement who is guided by the Chaplain. It has two Staff Advisors and student representatives from each class and a secretary. The activities are :

1. Morning worship during working days.
2. Special meetings on every Tuesday.
3. Hospital visits.
4. Contribution to Blind School Students
5. Carol rounds during Christmas.

Christian Education Council Diploma Class :

The Christian Education Council Diploma class was initiated in our college in 1991. The syllabus for the first year students is New Testament, second year - Old Testament and third year - Christian Faith. The classes are conducted every Wednesday evening. The annual examination is conducted in March.

KNOW YOUR UNIVERSITY

The Manonmaniam Sundaranar University :

This college was established in 1964. For a couple of years it was affiliated to the Madras University. With the establishment of the Madurai University on 6th Feb. 1966 this college became affiliated to Madurai University, the name of which was changed as Madurai Kamaraj University with effect from 22nd July 1978.

With the inauguration of the Manonmaniam Sundaranar University on 07-09-1991 at Abishekepatty, all the colleges of the Tirunelveli, Tuticorin and Kanyakumari districts have become affiliated to the new University.

This university was formally inaugurated by Dr. M. Karunanithi, the then Chief Minister of Tamil Nadu on 07.09.1991 with Dr. Vedagiri Shanmugha Sundaram as its first Vice-Chancellor.
