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12. (a) How does Sidney defend the poets use of fiction and imagination in crafting literary works? What role does he ascribe to poetic invention in enriching the human experience?

- (b) Discuss Johnson's critique of Shakespeare's use of language and diction in his plays. How does Johnson reconcile Shakespeare's linguistic innovations with the traditional norms of English literature?

13. (a) What is Wordsworth's opinion on the use of poetic language and diction in his Preface to *Lyrical Ballads*? How does he advocate for a departure from the ornate and artificial language of traditional poetry?

- (b) What is Coleridge's perspective on the role of the poet in society, as presented in *Biographia Literaria* Part II Chapter 14? How does he envision the poet's function and responsibility in shaping cultural and intellectual discourse?

- (b) What does Jung propose as the therapeutic potential of poetry in "On the Relation of Analytical Psychology to Poetry"? How does he advocate for the use of poetry as a means of psychological healing and self-discovery?

16. (a) Discuss the notion of "spectacle" as outlined by Aristotle. How does spectacle contribute to the overall impact and effectiveness of a theatrical performance?

- (b) Evaluate Longinus's concept of "sublimity" and his identification of the five sources of sublimity in literature. Discuss the effectiveness of his framework in analyzing and understanding the transcendent quality of literary texts, drawing upon examples from different genres and historical periods.
17. (a) Critique Sidney's defense of poetic invention and imagination as essential components of literary creation. How does he address concerns about the potential for falsehood and deception in poetic fiction?

Or

- (b) Critique Johnson's defense of Shakespeare's linguistic innovations and his role in shaping the English language. How does Johnson reconcile Shakespeare's linguistic experimentation with the traditional norms of English literature?

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18. (a) Evaluate Wordsworth's concept of poetic language and its role in his vision of poetry as expressed in his Preface to Lyrical Ballads.

Or

- (b) Analyze Coleridge's discussion of the interplay between reason and imagination in Biographia Literaria. How does he reconcile their seemingly contradictory functions in the creative process?
19. (a) Critique Arnold's proposed solutions for addressing the deficiencies of modern society in "Culture and Anarchy," considering their feasibility and effectiveness.

- (b) Assess Pater's argument for the enduring relevance of Renaissance ideals in contemporary society, considering its implications for modern cultural sensibilities and values.
